The Motter family, who previously had two students graduate MIS, pledged to donate \$250,000 over the next five years to our business program. In honor of their generosity, our business program has been renamed "The Motter Family Business Program." This donation will help open more opportunities for our current and future students.

Theresa Motter, former CEO of Van's Kitchen, is an active member of Mary Immaculate Church and was the September Business Speaker for our students. Van's Kitchen is a family-owned business whose founders were Van & Kim Nguyen, Vietnamese immigrants. Today, Van's Kitchen's food and famous egg rolls can be found nationwide. They are a business whose principles are based on faith, family, and friendship and demonstrate this with their donations to places like the North Texas Food Bank. Van's Kitchen has also supported women leaders in business and promotes women-owned businesses. "There are opportunities for us to show God's love and live biblical principles in the marketplace." Mrs. Motter described as the reason for their donation. Mr. Pulido, our business program teacher, is incredibly grateful for their donation. He already has several ideas on how these funds will be used. He would like to give our students different experiences such as going on field trips, having a more robust series of business speakers, and implementing the Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association Foundation, also known as SIFMA, to MIS. Mrs. Motter hopes that these funds will inspire our student entrepreneurs to have a business mindset since, as she stated, "It is an amazing opportunity for middle schoolers to learn about business and money management." Mr. Pulido also believes that this will help bring more visibility and sets MIS apart from other schools in the Diocese. "Having these funds," Mr. Pulido stated, "will help our 8th graders leave with the four main pillars in business: knowledge on financial markets, personal finance, business plan development, and emerging technologies."
