In 7th and 8th grade there is an elective called Robotics where students can learn about coding and create many different things. One student said, "It is an incredibly fun experience, and you can learn about coding while talking with friends and having fun. You should also be careful though while handling the robot because if you drop it or accidentally move a part it can mess up the whole thing. I would definitely recommend trying this elective." The main purpose of this class is to build a robot design and then code it to do something. The codes used are based on the scratch programming system and they use two different Lego models, the Lego Mindstorms EV3 and the Lego Spike Prime. Lego provides instructions for a specific design and new learning blocks, so the student can enhance the code for the robot to do many different things. Beginning students start by creating a driving base with four wheels and then they learn to move it in different ways. The more advanced students have been creating many different and interesting designs such as a grabber, a CNC machine, a break dancer, and a weather forecasting machine! Mrs. Loshelder said, "My favorite thing about teaching Robotics is the excitement I see when the students successfully code their robot to do whatever task they are trying to do." Mrs. Loshelder also said "I think that Robotics helps students with more than just hands-on design skills but with problem-solving to make the robot move and react, all of which enhance critical thinking skills. I am hoping that we are building future engineers!" Overall, Robotics is an amazing elective you can take in 7th and 8th grade that you definitely should do if you love coding, robots, and having fun while making an amazing creation!
